Tech Bytes: Blacks In Technology Foundation enters Nashville; two college systems adding IT certificates

Consulting, organized the local chapter of a global nonprofit that has 13,000 members in seven countries. The pair worked with the Greater Nashville Technology Council to create the chapter — which is free to join and has many training programs that often are free or discounted. "It's important to continue to build the Nashville tech pipeline as more technology-driven companies start in and relocate to Nashville," Rachel said. "Building the diversity of that

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pipeline is equally as important to make sure that all communities can be lifted and enriched by the city's growth."

Artificial intelligence firm Lucd has <u>followed a \$9 million raise in late 2020</u> by adding another \$2 million from a pair of investors, according to a new SEC disclosure.
